A virtue is a good habit.

A good habit is called a virtue. A bad habit is called a vice. Habits grow by practice. God always gives us the grace to choose and do what is good. If we think about what is right and open our hearts to God, we will make good choices and grow in virtue. Virtues make us free, happy, and holy.

Who are the Saints?

A saint is a person who is in heaven.

God wants us all to become saints in heaven. When the Catholic Church tells us we can be sure a certain person is in heaven, that person is a *canonized* saint. These saints loved God very much and led lives filled with virtue. They give us good examples of how to get to heaven and we can ask them to help us with their prayers.

SAINT OF THE MONTH:

Saint Joseph

(time of Jesus, Israel)

Feast: March 19 and May 1

Saint Joseph loved Jesus and took care of Him, even when Jesus' life was in danger. The evil King Herod wanted to kill the baby Jesus. So God told Saint Joseph in a dream to take Mary and Jesus to Egypt, where they would be safe.

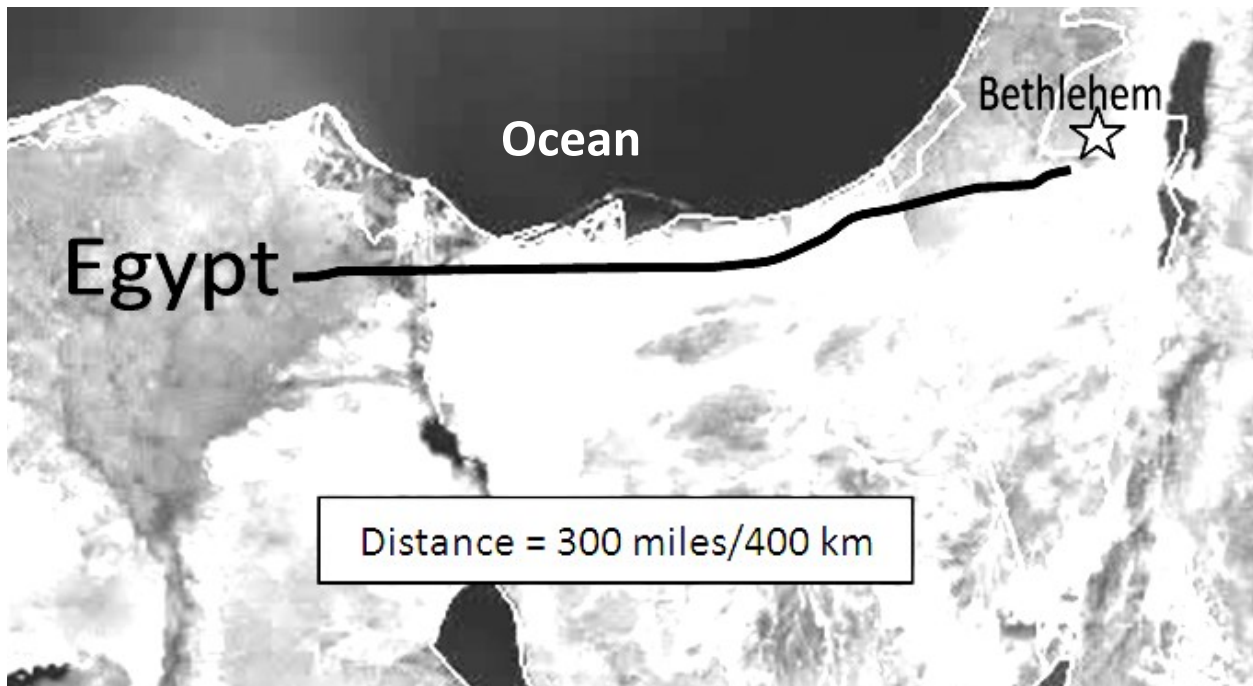
HOPE: trusting in God's loving plan

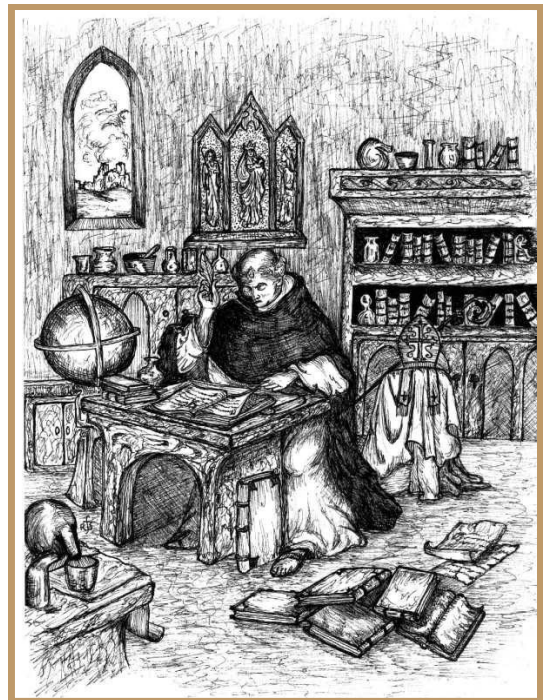
VIRTUE OF THE MONTH:

SAINT OF THE MONTH:

Saint Albert the Great
(1206-1280, Germany)
Feast: November 15

Saint Albert joined the Order of Preachers (the Dominicans) and became a great teacher. But even before he was a teacher, he was always a great student! Saint Albert loved to learn about the world God created. Knowing more about creation helped him grow in loving what was real—the Truth. And loving the Truth means loving God. Because of his study of nature, St. Albert was also one of the first people to be called a scientist!

DISCUSSION:

How can you show that you want to grow in knowledge?

HOME PROJECT: Due October _____

PRAYER:

Come, Holy Spirit, open our minds and our hearts to God's living Word!(Read and discuss Matthew 5:14-16 or Wisdom 13:3-6.)

VIRTUE ACTIVITY:

Read these words from the Bible: "Let the earth bless the Lord, praise and exalt Him above all forever. Mountains and hills, bless the Lord; praise and exalt Him above all forever. Everything growing on earth, bless the Lord; praise and exalt Him above all forever. You springs, bless the Lord; praise and exalt Him above all forever. Seas and rivers, bless the Lord; praise and exalt Him above all forever" (Daniel 3:74-78).

How do these created things, that cannot think or talk, "praise the Lord"? How do we "praise the Lord" when we learn about the things He has created?

How can we show that our true hope is in God when we study things like science, math, and history?

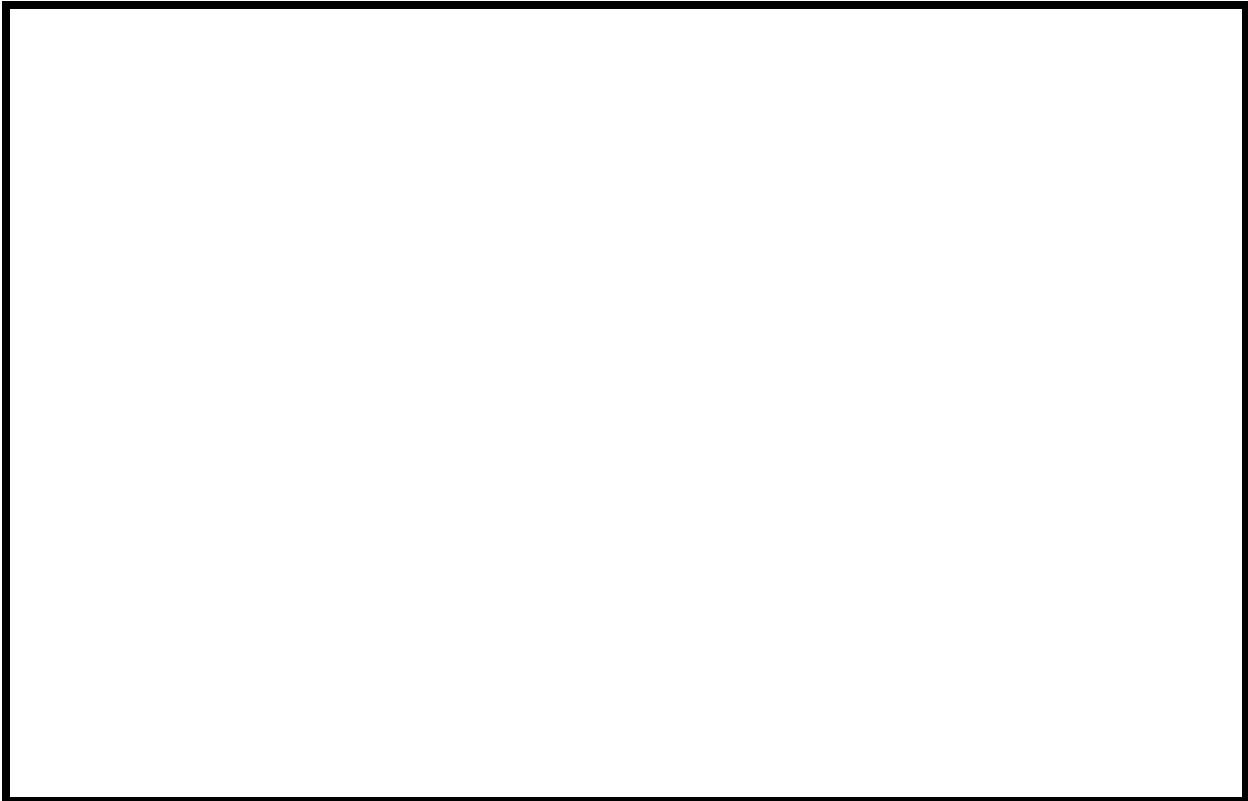
HUMILITY: accepting your limitations and God-given talents

SAINT OF THE MONTH:

Saint Monica

(322-387, Africa)

Feast: August 27

Saint Monica grew up believing in Jesus. Her husband did not believe in Jesus, and that made her sad. Her son did not believe in Jesus either and lived a bad life. That made her even more sad, and she prayed every day that her husband and son would believe in God. Finally, they did believe in God, and Saint Monica's son loved God so much that he became a saint, too—Saint Augustine!

DISCUSSION:

Have you ever had to wait a long time for something good?

PATIENCE: waiting or enduring without complaint

HOME PROJECT: Due December _____**PRAYER:**

Come, Holy Spirit, open our minds and our hearts to God's living Word!(Read and discuss Psalm 130:5-8.)

**VIRTUE ACTIVITY:**

During Advent, we wait for Jesus to come at Christmas. But sometimes it is hard to be patient! To help you be patient waiting for Jesus, make an Advent Calendar:

1. You will need two pieces of paper, 11x17, one white and one a different color; a pencil; crayons or markers; scissors; and glue.
2. On the colored paper, draw 25 doors in different places, but not in the corners! Write a different number, 1 through 25, on each door. Cut them with your scissors so that they open and shut. Fold them open and lay the white paper underneath; glue the papers together at the corners.
3. Through each open door, draw a picture of something at Christmas; be sure to draw Baby Jesus under the door that has "25" on it.
4. Close all the doors and only open one each day in December—no peeking!

How is patience kind of like hope? Did Saint Monica's patience show her hope in God? How?

PATIENCE: waiting or enduring without complaint

PRAYER:

Dear Saint Monica, help me to be like you and pray to God without giving up. Please pray for my family, too, that they will love God and be saints like your son! Amen. Saint Monica, pray for us!

SAINT ACTIVITY:

Saint Monica prayed every day for 30 years for her son to love God—that equals 10,950 days! As a class, see if you can count this many things at school. Here are some ideas:

1. Work on a number line that goes to 10,000; see how many times it has to wrap around the room.
2. Measure the classroom, hallway, or some other area until you count 10,000 inches.
3. Make 100 stacks of 100 pennies (or 100 groups of 100 other small objects).

Fidelity: keeping promises

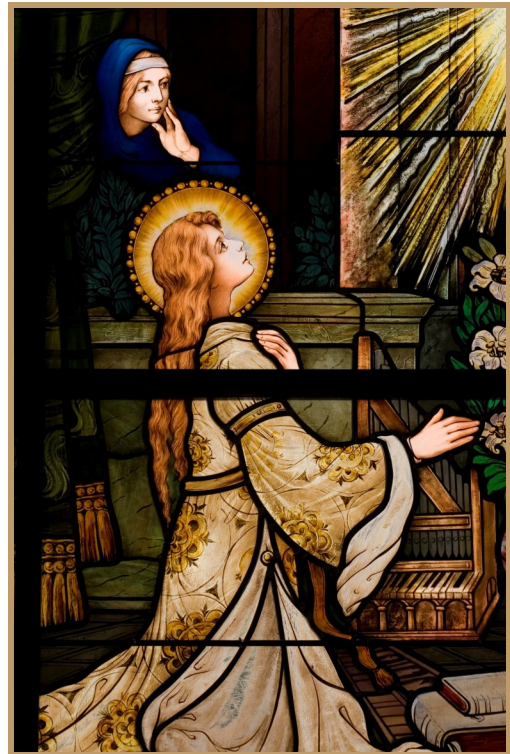
SAINT OF THE MONTH:

Saint Cecilia

(died 177 A.D., Italy)

Feast: November 22

Saint Cecilia prayed every day and could see her guardian angel. She promised to give her whole life to God and never get married. But her parents asked her to marry a wealthy young man, Valerian, and Saint Cecilia always obeyed her parents. While the wedding music played, she sang prayers to God in her heart. That is why she is the patron saint of music. She taught Valerian about Jesus, and they both gave their lives to God.

HOME PROJECT: Due January _____

PRAYER:

Holy Spirit, open our minds and our hearts to God's living Word! (Read and discuss Revelation 2:10.)

VIRTUE ACTIVITY:

Have you ever made a promise? Was it hard to keep?

As a class, choose a promise to make for one day, and help each other to keep it. Choose something everyone can do, something others can tell whether they are doing it or not.

When one whole day is up, discuss:

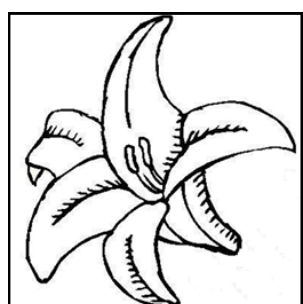
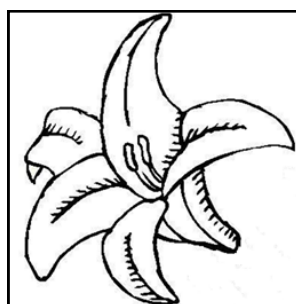
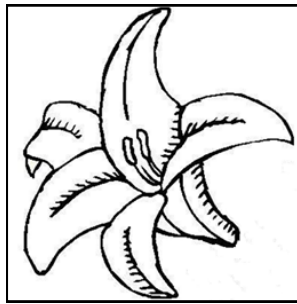
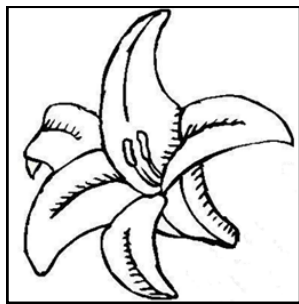
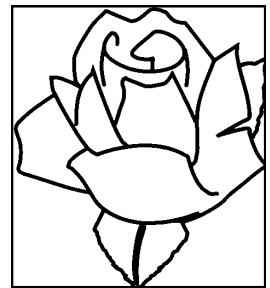
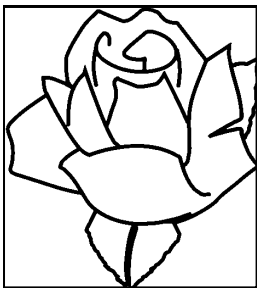
- Did you keep your promise?

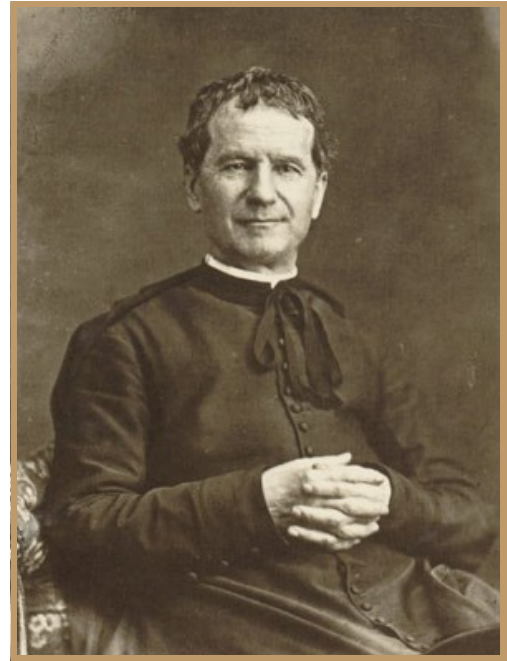
Cheerfulness: Looking on the bright side

SAINT OF THE MONTH:

Saint John Bosco

(1815-1888, Italy)

Feast: January 31

As a child, Saint John Bosco gathered other boys his age on Sundays after Mass to tell them Bible stories and do magic tricks, or walk on a tightrope, or juggle for them. When he grew older, John Bosco founded the Salesian Order of priests to help homeless boys have a safe home and learn a trade. He asked the boys to say three *Hail Marys* each night so that the Blessed Mother would keep them away from sin. The boys loved to listen to Saint John Bosco. They knew he loved them. He would organize games for them and make sure they had time to play. He encouraged the boys to be like Jesus in everything they did, whether they were working, praying, studying, or playing.

CHEERFULNESS: looking on the bright side

DISCUSSION:

How did Saint John Bosco teach the boys to love God?

HOME PROJECT: Due February _____

PRAYER:

Come, Holy Spirit, open our minds and our hearts to God's living Word! (Read and discuss Proverbs 15:30a.)

VIRTUE ACTIVITY:

Role-play the following situations. Think of a way to cheer this person up!

1. Your baby brother is crying because his toy broke.
2. Your friend is sad because she lost the game.
3. Your dad is tired from a long day at work.
4. Your sister is sad because she got in trouble.
5. Your mom is upset because she just burned the dinner she was cooking.

How is cheerfulness related to hope?



PRAYER:

Dear Saint John Bosco, help me to serve others in joy. When I see others who are sad, help me to have a cheerful heart and bring them hope. Amen. Saint John Bosco, pray for us!

SAINT ACTIVITY:

One day Saint John Bosco saw Dominic Savio, his student, looking sad. Dominic had decided to make many sacrifices and suffer for Jesus. Saint John Bosco taught him that God wants us to *find joy in everything*, even sacrifices, and not to be sad.

Act of Hope

VIRTUE OF THE MONTH:

Temperance: only having a healthy amount of something good

SAINT OF THE MONTH:

Saint Teresa of Avila

(1515-1582, Spain)

Feast: October 15

Saint Teresa sometimes had trouble with self-control, especially with the amount of time she spent reading and talking to friends. As she grew closer to God, she learned to give the right amount of time to Him and to others. When she joined the Carmelite nuns, they had forgotten their rules about how much time they should be in silence so that they could talk to God. She helped them to take time for silence and prayer *and* to take time to play and have fun together.

DISCUSSION:

How did Saint Teresa grow in temperance?

TEMPERANCE: Enjoying things in a proper, balanced way

HOME PROJECT: Due March _____

PRAYER:

Come, Holy Spirit, open our minds and our hearts to God's living Word! (Read and discuss Luke 9:23.)

VIRTUE ACTIVITY:

We use the virtue of temperance to fight temptations and to use well the good things that God gave us, like food, games, and toys. Act out the following situations and show how you would be temperate:

- Your Mom bakes your favorite cookies, and you feel like eating all of them before dinner. What could you choose to do?
- Two friends really want to play on the computer all afternoon and not stop to do their homework. Act out a temperate choice.
- The teacher puts new, cool pencils in the pencil jar at school. You want to take more of them, but you already have three. Act out a choice you should make.

How does only having a healthy amount of something help us hope in God?



TEMPERANCE: Enjoying things in a proper, balanced way

PRAYER:

Dear Saint Teresa, please help me to always use God's gifts with thankfulness and self-control. Show me how to take and use only what I need, not all I want. Help me to be temperate for love of Jesus! Amen. Saint Teresa of Avila, pray for us.

SAINT ACTIVITY:

Once when Saint Teresa was helping a convent, the first thing she did was get the sisters more food to eat. They did not have enough to be healthy and could not focus on praying.

Temperance means doing things in moderation. When the sisters were temperate they were happier and holier than before! Having enough food meant that they were able to be healthy and serve Jesus with greater strength. When they started giving more time to prayer, their time for *play* became even more fun. Saint Teresa would lead the sisters in joyful times together, and even played guitar and taught them Spanish dances!

Listen to a recording of Spanish guitar music from a CD or the internet. Teach each other some dances you know!

April

PRAYER:

Act of Hope

VIRTUE OF THE MONTH:

Obedience: saying "yes" to God and those who stand in His place

SAINT OF THE MONTH:

Our Lady

(Time of Jesus, Israel)

Feasts: 1/1, 2/11, 3/25, 5/13, 5/31, 8/15, 8/22, 9/8, 9/15, 10/7, 12/8, 12/12

Even as a little girl, the Blessed Virgin Mary prayed a lot and loved God. She knew that when she obeyed her parents, this was pleasing to God.

When God sent His angel to ask Mary to be the Mother of Jesus, her heart was open to say "yes". During her whole life, Mary always wanted to do what God wanted. Even when Jesus suffered on the cross, Mary said "yes" to God's will. Now she is the Queen of Heaven and Mother of all of us!

OBEDIENCE: saying "yes" to the loving will of God and those He has set over us

DISCUSSION:

How did the Blessed Mother show she was obedient to God? How can you show obedience to God?

HOME PROJECT: Due April _____

PRAYER:

Come, Holy Spirit, open our minds and our hearts to God's living Word! (Read and discuss Luke 1:26-38.)

VIRTUE ACTIVITY:

Play "God Says" (Like "Simon Says"). When you hear "God Says," do what you are told; if you don't hear "God Says," don't do it!

1. God says, "Fold your hands to pray, close your eyes, and kneel."
2. (whisper) God says, "Open your eyes."
3. (whisper) "Stand up." (Gotcha!)
4. God says, "Turn to your neighbor, give the sign of peace, and say 'Peace be with you.'"
5. Simon says, "Sit down and cross your legs!" (Gotcha!)
6. (whisper) God says, "Put your hands in the air, jump up and down, and shout 'Alleluia!'"
7. (whisper) "Bend down and touch your toes." (Gotcha!)

Did you have to listen well to hear? How does the virtue of hope help us to be obedient?

OBEDIENCE: saying "yes" to the loving will of God and those He has set over us

PRAYER:

Dear Blessed Mother, you always said “yes” to God, even when it was very hard. Please help me to also say “yes” to God like you did. Amen. Mary, Handmaid of the Lord, pray for us.

SAINT ACTIVITY:

Listen as your teacher reads from the Bible about the Annunciation and the Visitation (Luke 1:26-45). Do you recognize in here any words we pray in the *Hail Mary*?

Saint André was the son of a wood cutter, and all his life he worked very hard. He cut wood, baked bread, and made shoes. Whatever he had to do, he worked at it until it was done right.

When André became a religious brother he was assigned to answer the door at a college, which he did for many years. He also had a great devotion to Saint Joseph, and built a shrine in his honor. Many people who were sick came to Saint André for help. He would pray with them, and many were cured!

VIRTUE ACTIVITY:

Sometimes it can be difficult to finish a job that takes a long time. Here are some things you can do together at school. These may take a while, so be diligent and work hard until you are finished!

1. Weed all of the flower beds around the church or school, making sure to get even the small weeds.
2. Ask your teacher what things in your classroom need to be organized, sorted, or cleaned.
3. Divide into pairs and offer to help other teachers in the school clean their classrooms.

How does the virtue of hope help us to practice diligence?

DILIGENCE: doing your best and working hard until you're finished

PRAYER:

Dear Saint André, you worked hard doing many good things to bring people closer to God. Please help me to do my best at all my work, no matter how long it takes or how big or small the job. Help me to do it for Jesus. Amen. Saint André Bessette, pray for us.

SAINT ACTIVITY:

Saint André had a great devotion to Saint Joseph. Whenever anyone came to Saint André for help, Saint André “went to Joseph”—and gave him all the credit! In 1904, Saint André, along with some of the brothers in his religious community, built a huge shrine to Saint Joseph.

Make a shrine to Saint Joseph! You will need one shoebox, markers or crayons, colored paper, scissors, and glue.

1. Cover the outside of the shoebox with colored paper.
2. On a separate piece of thick paper or card stock, draw a picture of Saint Joseph standing on a square.
3. Cut around Saint Joseph and the square.
4. Fold the square under Saint Joseph.
5. Stand the shoebox on its short side—glue the square to the inside so that Saint Joseph stands up inside the box.
6. Write a prayer to Saint Joseph on top of the box.
7. Add more decorations or drawings to the shrine.

Acknowledgements

The *Virtues in Practice* program was originally written by a team of parents and faculty members at St. Gertrude School in Cincinnati, Ohio in 2005, and implemented beginning with the 2006 academic year. The program began as a nine-year cycle with students in kindergarten through eighth grade learning about a different virtue, and a saint who exemplified that virtue, each month. It was intended only for the use of St. Gertrude School, but within a short time it became clear that many schools desired the use of such a program.

To all who have contributed time and talent to the creation of this program, we are deeply grateful.

It is our prayer that all who read it will be inspired to pattern their lives more faithfully on that of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. May our lives radiate His virtues, so that others may come to know and believe in the life and love He offers freely!
